

CONVERSION NEARS COMPLETION

WORK to convert the school to Academy status is nearingcompletion. Recently, we have been consulting with staff and representative unions to move colleagues' employment status over to the Academy. Conversion should take effect from 1st September. May I remind parents that we retain Holland Park School as our title and, for students, there will be little notable change. We have made adjustments to our curriculum offer, thereby extending provision and opportunity for all.

Additionally, though not specifically linked to Academy status, we are introducing a 21-period week (an additional learning period). This will extend the curriculum further for all students. This move to Academy status is an exciting development for the school, alongside our brand new building and our exceptional examination performance, continued and growing enable success. The great outdoors



The arrival of the first batch of Westminster teak benches will also provide students with high quality, outdoor seating to rival any of London's most prestigious parks. And all of this is in addition to what awaits us on completion of phase 3 of the building project: an all-weather sports pitch, a further MUGA sport area, a mini-amphitheatre and even a nature trail.
