Debate at Oxford



AS one might imagine, it is very rare to see Colin Hall nervous. I accompanied him with my colleague, Daniel Seed, to the Oxford Union, where he had been asked to debate the ills of private schooling. I sensed a trace of anxiety – and I was sure this was not only because of the eight-minutetime limit! To settle the nerves, we were treated to a sumptuous afternoon tea with Dr Linda Kirk and Professor Richard Carwardine. President of Corpus Christi College, both friends of the school. After changing into our dinner jackets and joining the special guests to dinner, Colin took a tough line of argument to an implacable audience and some fierce

opposition. Nevertheless, he had no need to be nervous. His call to break the boundaries of segregation, to alleviate the constraints of financial disadvantage and to represent, in a single school, a social microcosm of the world. was emotionally compelling A loss by only seven votes (in an environment dominated by students from private schools) was, in my view, really a victory. And, to be greeted by our alumna, Olivia Porter (Pembroke College), at the end was an additional joy. In sharing all the excitement of her first year at Oxford, she embodied Colin's argument in its fullest form!

The event was dominated by beautifully attired students: ornate ballgowns balanced by an array of ostentatious dinner suits. KEY Stage 3 students this half term have had five weeks immersed in the study of *Hamlet*. Using 'Shakespeare Reinvented', the staff charity production of *Hamlet* as inspiration, students have explored the contrasting interpretations of the protagonist, Hamlet. Images from the staff production have been used to secure students' understanding of plot and character and provided many moments of delight. This, coupled with regular visits from members of the English

department and Leadership team in character in order to perform extracts or be interrogated by the class, has left students with a detailed understanding of this challenging play. In the final week of term students produced an extended piece of writing with the title 'How do you respond to the character of Hamlet?, with their responses demonstrating a perceptive understanding of the complex nature of the protagonist.

CREATIVE PAUSE FORTHOUGHT






Sublime summer of sport

THE summer sunshine has brought with it much success for our sports teams. The Under 12 rounders teams have been powered to success by outstanding performances from Emily Surminski who scored a total of 15 rounders in five games. Over 40 students from Years 7-9 competed in a local athletics festival at Willesden Sports Centre and Onosiokhue Yakubu won several titles including winning the 100 metres in 14.4 seconds. Fazle Chowdhury has chalked up some stunning statistics for the Under 12 boys cricket team including taking four wickets in one over whilst Ujebien Osmani and Zaki Hurst established a formidable partnership in the Under 13 boys victory over The London Oratory School. We had an honourable defeat at Ampleforth College on their stunning cricket pitch.

Apart from being an exciting and valuable experience, these awards will be excellent for students' future applications for university and employment.



IN addition to my responsibilities as Deputy Head and leading our wonderful Sixth Form students, my role in running the school choir feeds my soul! And what an extraordinary year we have had. Our private performance for Katharine Kent was particularly memorable, not least because it was our final performance before Year 11 students (Nerea Idigoras, Jennifer Jemminez-Cruz, Maureen Martisano, Sara Chalise, Brylle Perez and Esin Kart) left us to study for their final GCSE examinations. We are excited about this link and what our connection with her charity, Future Talent (which supports young musicians whose talents might otherwise be unacknowledged) might mean for the future. Since that date, our performance of Henry Purcell's great choral work, Come Ye Sons of Art with instrumentalists from the Royal College and local singers, was a wonderful experience for Violet Smart and Ellie MacCarthy, both of whom sailed to the top notes with their youthful vocal range. The orchestra was magnificent; for our students, performing with them was a rare musical apprenticeship. We are also deeply grateful for the money the concert raised for ongoing musical projects at Holland Park. Capping this off, we performed at Perfect Tense a wide range of music from many traditions: William Byrd's Mass for 3 Voices, Palestrina's renaissance classic motet Sicut Cervus and choral arrangements of U2's With or Without You and Billy Joel's Lullaby. The work is barely finished, though, before we make preparations for our tour to Paris in November – we are excited to recruit further teachers (who sing alongside our students) particularly in the tenor and bass range – there is a campaign to headhunt Mr Richard Ball for the forthcoming year!
